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FROM THE RABBI

In this time of renewal between Passover and Shavuot, we are preparing to honor our legacy of Jewish public service from B'nai Abraham with a Gala. It is a tremendous legacy by which to honor 125 years as a congregation. Complete with awesome music and

dignitaries, it will be an evening long remembered. I am deeply grateful not only to those congregants who are laboring to make this evening possible, but also to all those of our Temple's lay administration who have been instrumental in our success over the past few years.

Most of all, I thank our President, Monda Sagalkin, as her tenure as president soon concludes, for her tireless devotion to our community. As our Gala also invokes the legacy of Thomas Kennedy, more than a few members of the congregation have encouraged me to share with you a prayer that I recently offered to a full Senate Maryland Chamber. It was a great honor to be asked and to have our congregation's name invoked on the occasion of its offering.

O God, for Whom do We Seek In Heaven but You?

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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

I gave this “state of the congregation” at my last Trustees’ meeting. I thought I would submit it to the newsletter.

This being the last meeting of my two-year term chairing the trustees meeting, I want to report on the state of the Congregation. The short summary: while we face continuing challenges, we are a strong and vibrant institution.

Thank you to all of you for contributing to making this congregation a beacon of light in this tri-state area. We have an important mission. I believe that the Jewish community beginning at Sinai has survived over the centuries because of its values. Historically these values distinguish Jews from other religions. But even more important than this distinction, the Jewish faith system has greatly influenced and in many cases, has been the foundation of the formation of other faiths and their congregations. I am dedicated to these Jewish values and their importance as a lodestar for men and women around the globe. But, since our focus is the tri-state area, I strongly believe that we need to continue expanding our reach in the surrounding local communities, to be welcoming to the unaffiliated, as we practice and sponsor Jewish values.

The mission requires a financially stable institution having strong committees that work together to make things happen, I am happy to report both conditions exist at CBA.

Financially, we have closed both years of my term in the black, and that accounting does not include our major fund raiser, the Gala, which will we hold in about a month, June 16 to be exact. Generous gifts by all members have contributed to our robust financial health and I thank you. But, I would be remiss if I did not mention the significant contributions of friends of Congregation B’nai Abraham: Irving Einbinder and the Novenstein and Fifield families.

Our **endowment**, as well, as our current accounts, has increased during my term. We have modernized our endowment corporation. While our restricted endowment remains and has increased its value and we have created an unrestricted endowment which if conditions require may contribute to fund current accounts. Four years ago our endowment balance was a little less than \$350,000. Today it is at over \$750,000, with pledges from members’ estates of over a quarter of a million dollars. The endowment corporation

now includes an unrestricted endowment and the restricted endowment we have always had. We have also moved our endowment from the Fidelity and the United Capital group in West Virginia to Alliance Bernstein. This move was made on the advice of our endowment committee who looked into six firms and determined this was the best one to support our efforts to build our endowment.

Another asset we own is the Leitersburg property. About 10 years ago consideration was made to sell the land, but the Congregation rejected the proposal. We have continued to pay over \$1000 a year in taxes on this land — a drain on our budget with no benefit to us. So, during my first year as president we proposed, and the Congregation approved putting the land up for sale. The proceeds from the land when it sells will be invested in the endowment fund increasing the endowment to over one million dollars — this is essential to maintain our healthy financial position. Thank you to those who helped bring about a positive vote this time. With the sale and investment in the endowment we can further secure our future.

No Temple can survive without the active involvement of its committees. The committees are the pulse of the congregation. As with our bodies it is the pulse that keeps us alive and energized. Membership is essential to the lifeblood of this congregation. One of my important goals has been to continue the work Doug Lieberman began to modernize our membership policy. We now have a policy firmly in place that is welcoming to new members. The **membership committee** under the leadership of Margie Roames follows a detailed policy tailored to welcome new members, acquaint them with what the Congregation can offer them and encourage them to participate actively in the Congregation. We have a fair share instead of a dues structure, the latter often served to keep many prospective members away. The **religious practices committee** and the school have encouraged families to share Shabbat meals together. This is beginning to happen and has resulted in friendships being formed. More work will need to be done in this area.

In addition, our Temple phone is forwarded to my phone. A person now calling the Temple receives a friendly response from the president of the Temple instead of a recording. This has made a huge difference for some people.

The **social action committee**, under the leadership of Carole Lafferman and Carrol Lourie, has been energized. Their work is recognized in the community and they have used their work to promote Jewish values and to coordinate their programming with the Temple's programming. Because I believe it is important to lift up the community we live in, several of us are members of the Bester Neighborhood First committee. We participate in their activities and when appropriate will be inviting Neighborhood First members to participate in our activities.

Another initiative to lift up our neighborhood is the **Thomas Kennedy Park** across the street. Do you remember the two old dilapidated buildings that used to be there? By the end of the summer, God willing, you will now have a beautiful little pocket park. A park that is possible because of public and private partnership. It will include an amazing statue of Thomas Kennedy and a plaza. There will be a walk to the library. Because of neighborhood first interests there will be an area for children to play. The trees will be planted by the City, the gardens will be planted by my husband and The Monarch Alliance. These new gardens will be a nice compliment to the garden Leah Neveil has planted and maintained for us.

It has been especially rewarding to me that leaders of our committees have passed the baton to new leaders. A special example of this is the **building committee**. Ben Chlebnikow has led that committee for many many years. He began working with Mike Armel two years ago to pass on leadership of the committee. Mike has continued the working relationship that Ben has had with our caretaker Donnie and given him new responsibilities. In addition I meet with Donnie weekly. The result has been a wonderful working relationship with Donnie. The committee also updated our security program at the Temple after the problems in Charlottesville. The greeter program has become an integral part of our security.

Ways & Means, under the chairmanship last year of Buck Macht successfully raised over \$20,000 to support our bottom line. This year the committee with Buck and co-chair Rachel Nichols, is planning a wonderful concert and gala to celebrate the legacy of Thomas Kennedy and 125 years of Congregation B'nai Abraham. Please support it and enjoy it — June 16.

With the Rabbi's support we have been able to expand our programs. We hope that every member can find several in which they want to participate. Now not only do we have the traditional programs of lifelong learning, but we have added a B'nai Mitzvah class for adults on Saturday mornings and next year we will be able to attend a special service for those adult students. The Saturday programming has opened up additional opportunities for people to participate in our community. The Torah study group is well and regularly. I know I certainly enjoy

their company and have gotten to know members through the study group I would not have otherwise known. In addition, the luncheon after the service that ends the B'nai Mitzvah class and the tot Shabbat is an opportunity for members of families with young children as well as the older members of the B'nai Mitzvah class and the Torah study group to socialize in a relaxed atmosphere.

Judaism has survived because of its willingness to adapt to new circumstances. We went from a sacrificial cult temple religion with priests to a prayer based rabbinic religion worshipping in a synagogue. This change took place 2000 years ago and we have been continually evolving. The congregations that have not changed have died. Using modern technology has enabled us to reach out with our programming in a number of ways. Once a month the Rabbi prepares a drash for the religious school families. This is part of their curriculum teaching about Shabbat and supporting Shabbat observance at home. It was requested that the drash be sent to all congregants. We now do that. The drash has been especially appreciated by those congregants who are physically not able to come to the Temple. The innovative use of modern technology has also enabled us to prepare for their B'nai mitzvah students who were not able to fit into the traditional religious school structure. Two students successfully completed their training in the past two years. The parents of these students had tried unsuccessfully to have their children trained in religious schools in Montgomery county. Using this technology has also helped us expand our reach to young families outside our immediate area. Next year we will have a Bat Mitzvah of one of these long distance students. Because of these innovations and Barbara Schwab's hard work our religious school has new life. The last year Rabbi Raskind was here the Wednesday night Hebrew school class was eliminated because of lack of students and teachers. Rabbi Plost's first year I was still teaching on Sunday I had six students in my class. Two of these were the Rabbi's children. There were no children in the class just below my class. Because of the work Barb Schwab has done to provide programming for children pre-religious school, we now have a monthly tot Shabbat on Saturday mornings (referenced above) and a monthly Sunday program with the Rabbi and his wife for pre religious school as well as religious school students. Her work will ensure that there will be a vibrant religious school. Reform congregations across the USA are struggling with their religious schools. We are developing a model that these struggling communities can use to grow their religious schools. It is also exciting because it gives the young children a chance to have transformative experiences with their mentor tutors and their Rabbi.



Cantor Susan Berkson, a daughter of B'nai Abraham, will be the featured soloist and most of the program will be music written and conducted by renowned composer Simon Sargon, including a specially commissioned work. The concert will be followed by a dessert reception where you can congratulate the honorees and meet the composer.

We hope you can join us as we celebrate Thomas Kennedy's Legacy honorees: Fred Kramer was the first Jewish person to serve two terms on the Hagerstown City Council. City Councilman Lew Metzner has held elective office for five terms. Jessica Fitzwater is a current Frederick County Councilwoman.
